Our Aims and Purpose

- Enable children to hold balanced and well-informed conversations about religion and belief.

How do we do it?

- Religious Education is taught as a discrete subject.
- We follow the Lincolnshire Agreed Syllabus (2018).
- Teach units in a given order to ensure knowledge understanding is built upon.
- Ensuring that more major world religions are covered in detail.



The fundamentals

- RE contributes dynamically to children's education, provoking challenging questions about human life, beliefs, communities and ideas.
- Pupils learn from religions and world views about different ways of life in local, national and global contexts.
- Pupils discover, explore and consider many different answers to questions about human identity, meaning and value. Pupils think rigorously, creatively, imaginatively and respectfully about their ideas in relation to religions and world views.

Religious Education Strategies

Ensuring a balanced RE curriculum is followed by:

Looking at where beliefs came from and how these have altered over time.

Studying the different ways in which people practise their beliefs.

Allowing children to ask questions around morality and ethics.

Planning

At Horncastle Primary School we plan our RE based on the Lincolnshire Agreed Syllabus. The curriculum plans ensure that there is progression throughout the school and that children are building upon knowledge learnt in previous years. The units are designed so that pupils develop knowledge and understanding of the principal religions in Great Britain and Christianity is taught as a core religion in both key stages. Our RE curriculum allows children to see the similarities within the major religions and make connections. Where possible, teaching will be supplemented with trips to places of worship or visits from people from religious communities. In EYFS, RE is linked to the Early Years Profile and provides children with the opportunity to explore the world of religion in terms of special people, books, times, places and objects.
