Our Reading Spine at Horncastle

At Horncastle Primary School, our aspiration for each of our children is based upon the need for them to enter the world of work as articulate and literate individuals with a strong love of reading. We strive to give pupils a stimulating environment, where reading materials are at the heart of our learning and presented in an attractive and inviting way. The development of reading cannot be seen in isolation from writing, speaking and listening or drama.

From the earliest ages, reading is much more than decoding. From the start, reading is also accessing and further acquiring language knowledge and domain knowledge. This means that instruction and practice in fluency of decoding need to be accompanied by instruction and practice in vocabulary and domain knowledge. If we want to raise later achievement ..., we need to combine early instruction in the procedures of literacy with early instruction in the content of literacy, specifically: vocabulary, conventions of language, and knowledge of the world.'

The aim of this reading spine is to provide a list of books which staff can apply to their own long-term plans. These are books to use as a class read (Reading for Pleasure texts) and study books as a stimulus for writing (Core Texts). The intention is that by the time they reach year 6 and beyond, they have developed a wide, rich vocabulary and broader knowledge of the world and, as a result, are able to access the more complex books expected of them in secondary schools. It should be noted that book and text selection in school not only considers narratives and poems but also recognises that a good balance of topic-appropriate non-fiction should also be read to help further develop children's background knowledge of the subject they are studying and should be available in classes.

Learning to Read

These are books which are particularly supportive for children who are learning to read. Books are included here because they help children to behave like readers. They may be:

- memorable texts that feature repetition and encourage predictions
- texts within which rhythm and rhyme are important
- texts that allow children to practice and apply their phonic knowledge
- books with strong story shapes and structures
- texts which positively reflect children's interests and backgrounds
- books with supportive illustrations
- books that draw attention to written language and to the way books work

Reading for Pleasure

The reading for pleasure fiction collection was developed from Doug Lemov's work 'Reading Reconsidered'. In his book, Doug Lemov points out that there are five types of texts that children should have access to in order to successfully navigate reading with confidence. These are complex beyond a lexical level and demand more from the reader than other types of books. The selection in each age group aims to guide children (and staff supporting text selection) in ensuring children read books from these '5 plagues of reading': Archaic, Non-linear, Narratively complex, Symbolic/figurative and resistant.


As well as ensuring time is dedicated to enjoying a book together, we want to make sure the books on offer are inspiring and of a high quality. We are keen to provide pupils with books that act as both a window and a mirror – a window to other lives, and a mirror reflecting back their own experiences.

In each year group we have a reading spine, which is a set of carefully chosen books for each classroom. We hope these will provide quality reading experiences as well as showing the children a diverse view of our world. Our reading spine makes up the bulk of the texts used during story times in class, although there is also room to choose books based on the interests of the class.



Little Red Riding Hood	Traditional	A traditional take that makes us aware of Stranger Danger. We can join in with the repetitive parts and retell with puppets, story maps and through role play.
We're going on a Bear Hunt	Michael Rosen & Helen Oxenbury	A repetitive story that the children can join in with over and over again, developing their directional language . It gives opportunities for the children to participate actively whilst the story is being read, developing key listening skills . It also provides a starting point to discuss family dynamics .
The Pirate Mums	Jodie Lancet-Grant	A heart-warming story that introduces the children to one of many different family dynamics. It teaches children to celebrate those differences. It opens up the beginnings of discussions around discrimination and valuing diversity .

In this story, a little girl rarely speaks. Inspired and nurtured by Miss Flotsam, she slowly finds her voice. And when she does it is beautiful.
Zog	Julia Donaldson	A story by a much-loved author. This repetitive story with lots of opportunities for discussions around rhymes and poetry , adds to the child's imagination and world of fantasy. This story is rich in tier two vocabulary and teaches the children how to show resilience , when faced with a challenge.
The New Small Person	Lauren Child	A common struggle for childrena new baby in the family. This story helps children relate and regulate their emotions if a new sibling is due.
Amy Wu and the Patchwork Dragon	Kat Zhang	A story based on team work and producing something you are proud of. It also celebrates and teaches children about Chinese cultural celebrations and respect .

Astro Girl	Ken Wilson-Max	This story opens up lots of discussion around the popular topic of space and the role of an astronaut. It helps children to relate to parental separation and understand gender equality .

Links are made with information books about wolves and with their portrayal in fairy tales. The playful use of text and images offers opportunities for writing in a range of styles and text types.
The Iron Man	Ted Huges	A modern fairy tale with a dramatic opening and memorable language. A story of bravery, fear, prejudice and friendship. The book allows opportunities to learn about plot, character development and emotional response to themes and events.
Marcy and the Riddle of the Sphinx	Joe Todd Stanton	Links to our history focus of the Ancient Egyptians. An adventure story exploring family dynamics and overcoming fears to save loved ones. Many opportunities for engaging in authentic writing for different purposes and audiences.
